# MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

I have been working in community mental health my entire professional career and have recently seen enormous momentum for system change, funding transformation, and alignment with State and Federal initiatives. While change can be challenging at times, I see tremendous opportunity to increase access to services, improve integration of primary and behavioral healthcare, secure sustainable funding and continue to be a safety net for those underserved.

There are many reasons for my optimism, but leading the way is Senate Bill 1, Behavioral Health Matters, sponsored by Rep. Ann Vermilion and 56 other members of the House of Representatives. Seldom do we have such agreement from a broad range of constituents to support a bill. Consumer organizations, provider organizations, and the State of Indiana all came together to advocate, provide testimony and lend their support to this bill which has the ability to pave the way for system transformation - expanding community mental health through Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC), establishing an easy to remember toll-free help line to provide resources/referral (988) and focusing on crisis stabilization and mobile crisis initiatives, among other items.

While there was no funding attached to the bill, subsequent bills allocated money towards these initiatives. While there is consensus with the notion that the funding does not match the need or program sustainability long term, it is a start - a strong start.

Hamilton Center is prepared for the changes and opportunities presented. We have been operating a federally funded CCBHC grant for three years and have established 24-hour/7-day a week crisis services including mobile crisis services. It is our hope the momentum will continue and CCBHC



services will move from grant funding to sustainable reimbursement. Initial evaluation of outcomes from Indiana have shown CCBHC programs have been associated with a 73% reduction of depression and a 93% reduction of consumers hospitalized for mental health reasons. There are reasons to be optimistic.

The theme of this annual report, *The Ripple Effect*, dovetails very appropriately with understanding that behavioral health matters. The actions of one can affect so many. When one of our clinicians works with a consumer in need, multiple people are impacted. That person's entire support system is touched; families heal and entire communities become healthier. Thank you to everyone who understands and supports this premise each day. Behavioral health matters.

Received a \$3.99 million four year Substance
Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Certified
Community Behavioral
Health Clinic (CCBHC)

Received a \$25,000 Workforce Innovations in Integrated Care Grant from the National Council on Mental Wellbeing.

Received a two year Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Services Grant from the Indiana Department of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA).

Expanded primary care mobile services to all of Putnam and Vigo Counties through Grace Clinic Health Professional, Hamilton Center's Federal Qualified Health Center Look-Alike.

Began providing vaccinations to pediatric patients through Grace Clinic Health Professional.

Completed the fourth year of the DMHA EBP School Based Grant, which expanded schoolbased prevention services for youth and increased referral pathways for intervention services.

Awarded the Frederick R. Benson Trust funding to enhance programming for consumers in 24-hour services including the inpatient unit, supervised group homes and transitional living. Funding was used to provide opportunities to participate in community-based events and activities.

Received a three year accreditation for the Clubhouse program (Infinity House) which demonstrates the program's adherence to all standards in the categories of membership, relationships, space, work-ordered-day, employment, education, functions of the House and funding governance and administration.

Signed a memorandum of understanding with the North Vermillion School Corporation, North Central Parke School Corporation, and Greencastle School Corporation for the first time. These partnerships assist Hamilton Center in serving students in need of services.


Received a United Way grant to install seven little lending libraries in Clay, Parke, Sullivan, Vigo, and Vermillion counties.

Spent the year preparing for the July 1, 2023 "go live" implementation of a new electronic medical record - echoVantage.



### Primary Care Services Expand

# HAMILTON CENTER ADDS MOBILE GRACE

Grace Clinic Health Professional, the primary care clinic operated by Hamilton Center, Inc. and designated Federal Qualified Health Center Look-Alike, continued its expansion including boarding the geographic area of Mobile Grace and welcoming a new team of Nurse Practitioners.

First opened in 2019, the Clinic operates offices in both Vigo and Putnam counties. Comprehensive medical care, immunizations, laboratory services, and mental health services are offered, and referrals can be made to other specialists. Services are targeted to Hamilton Center consumers currently receiving behavioral health and addiction services as well as the general public. Medical care is offered to all ages through a sliding fee scale based on federal poverty

guidelines. No one will be turned away for inability to pay. Patients who do not have insurance can access a clinic navigator to assist in finding a health plan.

In addition, a mobile clinic, Mobile Grace, is available to travel to community sites where primary healthcare is needed. The medically equipped mobile vehicle reduces obstacles many people experience with lack of transportation and access to medical care. The mobile clinic will provide health screenings, primary medical care, and preventative care to children and adults in Putnam and Vigo counties.

A medical director, three nurse practitioners and several nurses make up the medical staff at the clinic. For additional information call (812) 231-8377, or go to www.mygraceclinic.org.
